Rathnavel, focusing on the emerging trends and future challenges in pharmaceutical intellectual property rights (IPR). S. Rathnavel began by addressing key emerging trends within the pharmaceutical industry. One major trend is the rise of digital health technologies, including telemedicine and personalized medicine. These advancements are transforming how treatments are delivered and managed, which in turn complicates traditional IPR frameworks. The integration of digital tools and platforms with pharmaceuticals creates new challenges in protecting intellectual property, as patents now need to cover not only drugs but also software and data-related innovations. The presentation highlighted the urgent need for updated IPR strategies that can effectively address these new technological domains.

Another trend is the growing emphasis on biopharmaceuticals, particularly biologics and biosimilars. The complexity of biologics compared to traditional pharmaceuticals has led to an increase in patent filings. However, this has also given rise to issues such as patent thickets, where overlapping patents create barriers to market entry, and evergreening, where patents are extended through incremental modifications. Rathnavel pointed out the necessity for clearer guidelines and regulatory practices to ensure that while innovation is protected, competition and access to affordable treatments are not unduly hampered.

Globalization of pharmaceutical markets was, also a focal point. The session discussed how international patent laws and regulations differ significantly across jurisdictions, which can



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complicate patent protection and enforcement. This fragmentation poses challenges for companies operating in multiple countries and can lead to legal disputes. Rathnavel stressed the need for greater international harmonization of IPR laws to streamline the process of obtaining and enforcing patents globally.

Looking to the future, Rathnavel addressed the impact of artificial intelligence (AI) on drug discovery and patenting. Al's role in accelerating research and development introduces complexities regarding patent ownership and inventorship. The presentation underscored that existing legal frameworks may not be fully equipped to address these issues, necessitating updates to accommodate AI's evolving role in innovation.

In conclusion, S. Rathnavel's presentation provided a comprehensive overview of the dynamic nature of pharmaceutical IPR. It underscored the need for continued adaptation of intellectual property strategies to address emerging trends and challenges. The session highlighted the importance of collaborative efforts among legal, regulatory, and industry stakeholders to create a balanced approach that fosters innovation while ensuring fair access to medicines.



Principal, Vice principal and staff honored the guest after program.



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

TITLE: Motivational Interviewing Techniques for Behavior Change

On 12/8/2023 , Narayana Pharmacy College hosted an impactful workshop titled "Motivational Interviewing Techniques for Behaviour Change," conducted by the esteemed Dr. S. Venkatesh. This event was designed to enhance the attendees' ability to support individuals in making positive behavioural changes through motivational interviewing (MI), a client- centered counselling approach.

Dr. Venkatesh, a renowned expert in behavioural science, began the workshop by introducing the foundational concepts of motivational interviewing. He explained that MI is a collaborative, goal-oriented method focused on exploring and resolving ambivalence to foster intrinsic motivation for change. The session was structured to blend theoretical insights with practical applications, ensuring that participants could both understand and implement MI techniques effectively.

A significant portion of the workshop was dedicated to the technique of using "open-ended questions." Dr. Venkatesh illustrated how these questions such as "What are your thoughts about making this change?"encourage clients to express their feelings and motivations more comprehensively. He led participants through role-playing exercises where they practiced crafting and using open-ended questions, thereby learning how to facilitate deeper and more meaningful conversations.

Reflective listening was another critical technique covered during the workshop. Dr. Venkatesh emphasized that reflective listening involves actively listening to clients and providing feedback that mirrors their statements, which demonstrates empathy and helps clients feel understood. This approach was practiced through various scenarios, allowing



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participants to refine their skills in providing reflections that validate and clarify clients' emotions and thoughts.

Dr. Venkatesh also highlighted the role of "affirmations" in motivational interviewing. Affirmations involve recognizing and reinforcing clients' strengths and efforts, which builds their confidence and motivation. Participants engaged in exercises to practice giving affirmations, learning how to offer positive reinforcement effectively and supportively.

Additionally, the workshop addressed the strategies for "rolling with resistance" and "developing discrepancy." Dr. Venkatesh explained that rolling with resistance involves accepting and acknowledging clients' resistance to change without confrontation, using it as a means to further explore their ambivalence.
